

Mita-Teknik Conflict Minerals Policy

From January 1, 2021, EU regulation 2017/821 has come into force, which purpose is to ensure that EU importers of 3TG (tin, tungsten, tantalum and gold) meet international responsible sourcing standards, set by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

This implies that none of these minerals most originate from any of the following:

- › Areas in a state of armed conflict.
- › Fragile post-conflict areas.
- › Areas with weak or non-existent governance and security, such as failed states.
- › Areas with widespread and systematic violations of international law, including human rights abuses.

At Mita-Teknik, we have collected written statements from all our suppliers that could potentially use these minerals in their products, to ensure that we do not use any conflict minerals in our supply chain.

Mita-Teknik performs supplier assessments to ensure that all its relevant suppliers comply with the EU regulation 2017/821 regarding conflict minerals.

Furthermore, our approach to conflict minerals is incorporated in our general terms and conditions, which is shared with suppliers along with every purchase order from Mita-Teknik.

If we at Mita-Teknik at any point identify a breach of the EU regulation, actions will be taken to eliminate this supplier's breach.
